Romans explains the fundamental role of faith in the believer's life. Abraham believed God's promise, and God considered Abraham righteous. Through faith in Jesus Christ, believers receive justification—a "not guilty" verdict by God. Do you believe this? If so, thank God for His grace.



1 CORINTHIANS: CONFLICTS AT CHURCH A Survey of 1 Corinthians



The Heart of the Matter

Corinth. Color her purple . . . gaudy . . . fast and vile, yet rich and influential. A city of about two hundred thousand free citizens plus half a million slaves, busy Corinth represented a lifestyle of loose living. Epicureanism mixed with prosperity, beauty, the arts, and sensual idolatry was the norm. *Korinthiazomai*, a Greek term coined by Aristophanes, describes a person who lives an immoral life.

Into the fast lane of this wicked city came Paul, who lived and worked among the Corinthians, ultimately establishing a local church. No ministry ever faced a greater challenge to survive . . . and few churches ever experienced greater conflicts. As we shall discover, this sixteen-chapter letter is comprised mainly of troubleshooting, confronting, exhorting, and correcting. No other New Testament letter gives the pastor of a church in conflict a broader base of preaching material as he leads his flock out of carnal dangers and into new territory of purity and unity.



Discovering the Way

1. The City: Background and Setting

Turn to the maps in the back of your Bible, find Corinth, and note its strategic location. Prosperous Corinth had everything important to the world—money, slaves, idolatry, and immorality—but not a church.

2. The Writer: Journey, Arrival, and Stay (Acts 16:7-12; 17:32-18:20)

Follow the apostle Paul from Troas to Corinth, from evangelist to tentmaker, and from synagogue to house church.

3. The Letter: Purpose, Style, and Content (1 Corinthians 1:10–13; 5:1–3; 6:1–11) Explore why Paul wrote this letter, how he addressed the issues, and what he chose to include.





2 CORINTHIANS: A MAN AND HIS MINISTRY A Survey of 2 Corinthians



The Heart of the Matter

Someone has called the writer of 2 Corinthians "The Transparent Apostle," for here, as in no other letter Paul wrote, the man bared his soul. Clearly the most autobiographical of all Paul's correspondence, this letter allows us to see the man and his ministry in true, unveiled terms. The letter was written from a defensive posture because Paul's apostleship was being questioned. But behind the strong words and forceful style is a heart tender toward God and committed to ministry—a beautiful, rare blend of strength and compassion.

In this letter, the afflicted apostle modeled how Christians should respond to suffering. He highlighted God's role as the perfect comforter. Paul also showed believers the connection between inadequacy in ministry and experiencing God's strength.

3. Second Corinthians for Today

Remember: it's brokenness that gives wholeness to a ministry; it's meekness that communicates strength in life; it's loneliness that makes us value companionship; and it's weakness that puts God's power on display.

Read 2 Corinthians and reflect on a time of suffering when God comforted you. Thank Him for His grace and share it with someone else this week.





The Heart of the Matter

This little six-chapter letter holds high the banner of grace. Though small, it packs a dynamic punch! Galatians liberates. It assaults the bondage of legalism more directly than any other Bible book and, except for the book of Romans, most thoroughly develops the answer to the question: are we saved by believing or by achieving? The clear announcement of this letter to Christians could be put into three words: *You are free*. Because Christ has done it all, there remains nothing left for us to do except believe—freely and fully—in His finished work for our eternal salvation.



Discovering the Way

1. The Letter: Several Introductory Matters (Galatians 2:4–11; 5:5–7)

Galatians is a strong affirmation of liberty based on grace, a bold attack on legalism based on works, and a needed encouragement for those caught in between.

2. Its Value: Why Galatians Is Significant (Galatians 1:6–9; 2:16; 3:23–26; 5:13–16)

This letter includes a strong warning, a confident affirmation, a simple statement, and a needed balance.

3. An Analysis: What It Includes





No one is immune to the temptation to drift from the true message and the true Master. Try reading Galatians daily for one week and allow the gospel to penetrate your heart and life.



EPHESIANS: TRUE PORTRAIT OF THE CHURCH A Survey of Ephesians



The Heart of the Matter

Although brief, Paul's letter to the Ephesians contains a wealth of profound information about the Lord and His church. It is, in fact, foundational to the doctrine of the universal church, the earthly body of Christ. It is also here that we learn of spiritual gifts and their purpose in the church, the proper relationships between family members at home, and the armor of God for His people. No serious student of Scripture remains ignorant of Ephesians. Its insights, principles, and practical admonitions are essential to our growth toward Christian maturity.



Discovering the Way

1. Introduction Information (Acts 18:18–19; 28:30–31; Ephesians 1:1; 3:1; 4:1) Learn about the writer and date of this letter, the recipients and where they lived, and the theme and purpose of Ephesians.

2. The Letter at a Glance (Ephesians 1:3–11; 2:11–15; 4:17–31; 6:10–18) See the attached outline, which divides Ephesians into two sections: doctrine (chapters 1–3) and practice (chapters 4–6).

3. Several Major Truths (Ephesians 1:4; 2:13–15; 3:6–8; 4:11–16)

Ephesians teaches that God chose us before creation, that Christ brings us to God by His blood, that Gentiles and Jews have been given equal status in the church, and that the church is a body comprised of various parts.







The Heart of the Matter

If you need warm encouragement, a cheery boost of joy, a happy and hopeful word to lift your spirit, you've come to the right place. Philippians has it all . . . and more. Free from complicated and knotty problems, these 104 verses offer authentic reasons to be thankful, joyful, and contented. And to think they were written by a man who was living under house arrest, bound by chains to a Roman guard all day long! How could Paul be so joyful? How could his charisma be so magnetic? It is because his focus was on his Savior (whom he mentions more than forty times in this letter) rather than on his situation. Let's learn a few vital lessons from Paul—a model of the message his letter contains.



For living with joy, we need the right model (Philippians 1:21). For serving with joy, we need the right attitude (2:5). For sharing our joy, we need the right goal (3:14). For resting with joy, we need the right release (4:6–7).

The Heart of the Matter

Colossians is the chart and compass which will enable us to sail a straight course between the dangers of viewing Christianity as merely a philosophy and of making it a lifestyle of rigidity. How we need this little yet potent letter! Beset by gnostic heresy and harassed by Greek philosophy, the saints at Colossae were in danger of losing their way. Paul wrote to help them get back on course, and in doing so, he helps <u>all</u> who take their eyes off Christ. Few Bible books focus such intense attention upon Jesus as Lord and as the ultimate solution to our problem of separation from God. In these chapters, we see Jesus clearly as our all in all.





1 THESSALONIANS: A HEART-TO-HEART TALK A Survey of 1 Thessalonians



The Heart of the Matter

Being one of Paul's earliest letters to find its way into the canon of Scripture, 1 Thessalonians includes a number of personal insights into his early life in ministry. We see and feel Paul's "heart" on several occasions. Although brief (fewer than ninety verses), this letter also outlines such practical matters as a church model worth emulating, a philosophy toward ministry worth following, a commitment to purity worth remembering, a hope of Christ's coming worth anticipating, and a love for fellow Christians worth duplicating. Let's pay close attention. This letter is an extremely helpful resource to turn to when any of these areas need to be strengthened.



Discovering the Way

1. Why Was the Letter Written? (1 Thessalonians 2:1–2, 17–18; 3:1–8; 4:1–12; 2 Thessalonians 3:6–10)

In the midst of suffering and opposition, Paul wanted to share the gospel with the Thessalonians.

2. Who Received It . . . and When? (1 Thessalonians 1:6–10)

Paul wrote to the saints who comprised the faithful church in Thessalonica.

3. What Does It Include? (1 Thessalonians 1:2–5; 2:1–7, 13–16; 3:11–13; 4:1–8, 13–18; 5:6–13)

Review the chart of 1 Thessalonians on the next page: chapters 1–3 of the book reflect on Paul's time with the Thessalonians, and chapters 4–5 exhort and encourage the Thessalonians to continue imitating Christ.



The Heart of the Matter

This little letter may be small in size and may appear to be rather innocuous, but it is both concentrated and potent. Written to correct a misunderstanding regarding the Lord's return, it not only clarifies some issues regarding prophecy but it also deals with several current matters of great practical value. Within these forty-seven verses, we find such helpful insights as the purpose of persecution as well as the importance of diligence, Bible study, personal discipline, minding our own business, and choosing the right companions. As we explore this letter, let's be sensitive to what God is saying to us—as it relates both to His prophetic plan and to His practical advice. Both are of equal importance.



Discovering the Way

1. A Brief Bit of Background (2 Thessalonians 2:1–2; 3:6–15)

Learn about the writer of 2 Thessalonians, about his reason for writing, and about the letter's recipients.

2. An Overview of the Letter (2 Thessalonians 1:3-4, 11-12; 2:1-17; 3:1-5, 10-13)

Paul wrote about pain and affliction in chapter 1. He taught about prophecy and corrected errors in chapter 2. And he encouraged perseverance in chapter 3.

3. A Few Enduring Truths

Persevering through affliction develops maturity. Trusting amidst confusion reveals stability. Waiting with discipline cultivates responsibility.

Read through 2 Thessalonians and examine your response to suffering, your faith in the midst of trials, and your personal obedience as you look for Jesus Christ's return.



The Heart of the Matter

Within the writings of Paul in the New Testament, we have three letters of special interest to local churches and their pastors. These are commonly called "pastoral epistles," referring to the books of 1 Timothy, 2 Timothy, and Titus. These three letters remain to this day as the most accurate and very best counsel a shepherd (and his flock) can receive. Written to men who were shepherds in the first century, these three letters have a relevant ring to them to this very day. This message looks into the first and the longest of these three letters, which contains the most thorough treatment of the subject. First Timothy addresses the role of the shepherd and his responsibility for the life of the flock. The shepherd must know and teach sound doctrine, live a godly life, and maintain order in the church. This letter highlights the importance of choosing godly leaders according to God's design. So many churches have drifted from God's design, but this letter guides the church back to Christ's original blueprint.

Learn about Paul and Timothy—the writer and recipient of this letter.

- 2. Reasons the Letter Was Written (1 Timothy 1:3–7; 3:14–15; 4:6–16; 6:3–5) Paul wrote to warn Timothy about false teachers, to instruct him about how to lead the church, and to encourage him to educate his flock.
- 3. An Overview of 1 Timothy (1 Timothy 1:1–16; 3:2–7; 4:1–16; 5:1–25; 6:1–19) Review the chart on the next page and discover that chapters 1–3 discuss the work of ministry and chapters 4–6 teach about the role of the minister.



Starting Your Journey

Shepherding is more practical than theoretical. Leadership is less glamorous than demanding. Ministry is to be balanced between commitment and contentment.



The Heart of the Matter

It's doubtful that we could find a more nostalgic, emotional letter written by the apostle Paul. Facing death alone in a dungeon, surrounded by memories and exposed to the elements, this grand old man wrote by candlelight a letter to his dear friend, Timothy. Paul had no assurance it would ever reach the young man but, nevertheless, he wrote it . . . and we are so grateful he did! For obvious reasons it is a letter of sharp contrasts—in some places it contains strong and passionate warnings laced with insightful wisdom and firm resolve, yet in other places it contains wearisome feelings, quiet and honest reflections, and even a few unguarded admissions of decisions made in years gone by. Here is a letter for the ages written by a rugged and tired warrior, an essential piece of biblical literature we need in order to construct an accurate and complete mental portrait of Paul and a spiritual understanding of our times.

Reflect on godly models in your life and thank God for them. Commit to modeling the character of Christ to a younger Christian.



The Heart of the Matter

Several books in the Bible don't get the publicity they deserve. Titus is a good example. Overshadowed by the far more popular letters of 1 and 2 Timothy, this pastoral epistle seems obscure and unimportant to some. Too bad. Equally essential and inspired by God, the letter to Titus brings a needed balance to the subject of guidance to pastors. First Timothy emphasizes doctrine. Second Timothy provides a charge, a strong emotional appeal to the pastor. But Titus brings a word of *caution*, a reminder that good works must accompany our proclamation of the truth and our defense of the gospel. The two letters to Timothy encourage him to protect and to preach, while the letter to Titus tells him to *practice* those things. While good works in no way lead to salvation, they are the irrefutable evidence of true salvation. Preachers need that reminder as much as anybody . . . sometimes more.

2. Overview of the Letter (Titus 1:5-16; 2:2-5, 9-14; 3:1-11)

3. The Christian and Good Works (Titus 1:16; 2:11–12; 3:8)


The book of Titus shows us several important truths: deeds defend or deny our doctrine; grace elevates godliness, never cheapens it; and behavior verifies belief.

Think about your conduct at work, school, or in relationships. Do your actions defend or deny your doctrine (your beliefs about God)? Explain.



PHILEMON: AN APPEAL FOR GRACE AND FORGIVENESS

The Heart of the Matter

About six years before his execution, Paul wrote a "postcard" to his longtime friend, Philemon, a citizen of Colossae. This, the shortest of the apostle's writings, is one of the grandest illustrations of grace and forgiveness in all of Scripture. It is a warm, passionate appeal to a slave owner to accept back, forgive, and reinstate his runaway slave named Onesimus. Because of the obvious analogy with our being accepted by God and forgiven through His grace, this little letter has become one of the most treasured in the New Testament. See if you don't agree as we work our way through these twenty-five verses.

Reflect on your life. Have you ever tried to flee God's presence? Thank God that through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ He has dealt with your enslavement to sin!


