PURPOSE	To motivate those working on the Temple to continue in spite of their own crop failures and financial distress. Rather than rebuking or condemning them, Zechariah inspires the people to work.			To give the workers hope that there is a better day, a far more glorious day, yet to come. Vivid scenes of the Messiah are included. He is revealed as coming, rejected, returning, and conquering.

KEY VERSES	Zechariah 4:6; 8:3; 9:9–10			
CHRIST IN ZECHARIAH	Zechariah is second only to Isaiah in the number of messianic passages it contains. Among Zechariah's explicit references to Christ are the angel of the Lord (<i>Zech. 3:1–2</i>); the righteous Branch (<i>Zech. 3:8; 6:12</i>); the King-Priest (<i>Zech. 6:13</i>); the cornerstone, tent peg, and bow for battle (<i>Zech. 10:4</i>); the Good Shepherd who is sold for thirty pieces of silver (<i>Zech. 11:4–13</i>); the pierced One (<i>Zech. 12:10</i>); and the coming Judge and righteous King (<i>Zech. 14</i>).
