
## Discovering the Way

#### 1. When Looking Back, Six Things Really Matter

Let's review the six principles that really matter: biblical principles are more important than traditional opinions, personal relationships are more valuable than individual accomplishments, domestic priorities rate higher than church programs, positive reinforcement is better than negative reactions, unconditional forgiveness is much preferred to lingering probation, and mutual respect is of greater concern than chain of command.

2. When Looking Ahead, Three Things Last (Genesis 1:26–27; 2:18, 24–25) At least three things will last into the future: the institutions of marriage and family—stay strong, God's plan and requirements for domestic harmony—stay discerning, and the effects of your influence—stay faithful.
